CALL TO ORDER: At 7:00 p.m., Mayor Gillespie read the Open Public Meetings Act statement in full, as printed on the agenda.

ROLL CALL: Mayor Gillespie took roll call; all were present.

Proclamation for Hispanic and Latino Heritage Month: Mayor Gillespie read aloud the following proclamation. She advised of the importance of recognizing Hispanic and Latino Heritage Month acknowledging those who live in our community.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, National Hispanic and Latino Heritage Month celebrates the Hispanic and Latino community and highlights its countless achievements; and

WHEREAS, the observation began in 1968 as Hispanics Heritage Week under President Lyndon B. Johnson, and was enacted into federal law on August 17, 1988, calling upon all the people of the United States to observe this time with ceremonies, activities, and programs; and

WHEREAS, many Latino Americans trace their roots to the cultures of the indigenous peoples of the Americas- including the Arawaks, the Aztecs, the Incas, the Maya, and the Tainos, some trace their roots to the Spanish explorers, or to the Africans who were brought as slaves to the New World; and

WHEREAS, September 15th to October 15th is recognized as National Hispanic Heritage Month, which is a time to honor the invaluable ways Hispanics and Latinos contribute to our common goals, celebrate their diverse cultures, and to work towards a stronger, more inclusive, and more prosperous society for all; and

WHEREAS, this month's theme, "A History of Serving Our Nation" Hispanics and Latinos have and continue to serve as Civil Rights leaders, politicians, military service members, educators, first responders, science pioneers, and public servants for our country; and

WHEREAS, Hispanics have enhanced and shaped our national character with centuries old traditions that reflect the multi-ethnic and multicultural customs of their communities, while adding their own distinct and dynamic perspectives to the story of our country.

Presentation by Vince DePalo of The Telecom Company regarding Internet Service:

Mayor Gillespie advised that Mr. DePalo is present to discuss an alternate option to Comcast internet for residents and businesses. She noted that there is often rumor about Moorestown refusing Verizon FIOS in town. She indicated that same is absolutely not true and asked Mr. Zipin to explain the circumstances behind Verizon FIOS not being available to serve Moorestown residents and businesses. Mr. Zipin explained that there is a contract between the NJ Board of Public Utilities and Verizon. Part of the agreement was written to prevent Verizon from cherry picking where to lay the cable; and a roll out schedule (for installation around the State)

was written into the contract. As the process was underway, technology was changing, and ultimately, Verizon was no longer investing in FIOS; they are now going wireless. He advised that in the end, it is all a function of a statewide contract and the technology changing before it was completely rolled out. Mayor Gillespie advised that at this time, the Township only has one option for internet service. Tonight, a presentation will be made on a potential option for the service.

Vincent DePalo, CEO of the Telecom Company, thanked Council for the opportunity. He provided a background on his company, who delivers high-speed wired and wireless broadband internet. He advised of the areas (mostly New York) where their services are delivered. He reviewed his power point presentation, "Moorestown Open Broadband Initiative." Mr. DePalo advised that his company is not looking to provide exclusive services; competition is good and this could allow smaller carriers to use the same network. He advised that through the use of the water towers, they could provide eighty-percent coverage over the town. He advised that they would use the Township's underutilized infrastructure in exchange for a surcharge. He advised of the benefits to the community: income stream from surcharge (to be determined by Township); more competition and choices for residents; better internet services (higher, symmetrical speeds, more uptime); more affordable internet plans available; subsidies for low income residents (determined by Township); revenue from use of existing and underutilized municipal assets (rooftops, structures, fiber). He advised that the company would also use the Township fiber network ring; they would not interfere with the capacity; they would utilize and expand the ring.

Questions of Council were answered by Mr. DePalo.

Mayor Gillespie asked for comment from the Telecommunications and Technology Committee (T and T Committee). Kristine Piccola, 190 Stanley Avenue, expressed her excitement over the idea of providing an option to residents and businesses.

Daniel Wilt, 347 East Main Street, Chairman, advised that the general consensus of the committee was to look into this solution. He felt the committee supports the idea.

Public Comment: None.

Mayor Gillespie suggested seeking next steps from the T and T Committee. She felt, if the Township moves forward, it should start with a small group of residents. She asked for a written proposal from Mr. DePalo. He agreed to same and to starting on a trial basis (deploying five or so sector antennas in a selected area of town). Mayor Gillespie asked for confirmation that the only risk to the residents is the cost of the equipment and that there is no risk or cost to the town; Mr. DePalo confirmed same. She asked the T and T Committee to also thoroughly review same. Mr. Van Dyken indicated that Council is not endorsing one company over another; it is exploring its options. Mayor Gillespie advised that this endeavor could result in a revenue for the town; the more residents the more revenue.

Roger Boyell, 416 Parry Drive, asked if the eighty-percent coverage included Route 38. Mr. DePalo was not certain advising he will look into it.

Michael Barson, 57 Eraser Road, advised that when they performed the wireless propagation there was a dead area near Strawbridge Lake; if an antenna were placed out here, coverage would be at ninety to ninety-percent in the municipality.

Mayor Gillespie thanked Mr. DePalo for his time and presentation.

DISCUSSION

Reports from Members of Council

Mr. Zipin had nothing to report on the Planning Board. He advised that the Open Space Advisory Committee met with Chris Schaffer about trail enhancement and networking the trails in a more comprehensive way.

Mr. Van Dyken advised that Sustainable Moorestown is moving forward with the investigation into the Pulverizing site and it is still in the process of getting an outside counsel opinion on potential financial recovery by the Township in connection with the contaminated water situation. Mr. Van Dyken advised that the pollinator project at Swede Run is quite amazing and encouraged all to visit the site. He advised that the fall recreation programs are in play and that there has been some vandalism in the park(s). He asked that the public be on the lookout and to report any suspicious activity.

Mr. Law extended a warm welcome to the new Director of Public Works. He thanked the Benders for all they do for community; congratulated them and noted what an amazing evening the Citizen of the Year Dinner was. Mr. Law advised that the town-wide yard sale is Saturday, October 2. He advised that Better Together Moorestown has launched the community survey and he encouraged all to complete it; the task force's goal is to receive 2,000 responses. Mr. Law advised that both the Tree Planting and Preservation Committee and the Environmental Advisory Committee are working on the environmental resource inventory publication.

Ms. Mammarella had nothing to report on the Appearance Committee. She noted her appreciation for the fact that the construction of a bank next to the Wawa is almost finished. Finally, she advised that the Better Together Survey process is going well; it closes on October 31 and encouraged participation. She extended a special thank you to Kelly Flynn, who has been a big (social media) help and the Library for providing paper copies of the survey to anyone who needs it.

Mayor Gillespie advised that the Mission Voice 5K Race was held on September 18; she walked in it and it was a terrific day. She extended thanks to the O'Donnell family for organizing the event and raising funds for special needs programs. She advised that she attended the dedication of the new playground and children's pond at Strawbridge Lake. Mayor Gillespie thanked all those that showed up for the Tractor Trailer Challenge held by the DiPasquale family

to receive donations for Hurricane Ida victims. She asked all to mark their calendars for Autumn in Moorestown. She advised that the EDAC meets tomorrow.

Mr. Aberant advised that Council previously awarded a contract for the secondary digester at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Last week, one of the primary digesters was completely clogged. He explained the treatment of sewage and what would happen if the digesters were not cleaned and repaired immediately, noting this is an emergency. If the condition is not addressed, the plant will stop operating. Mr. Aberant advised that the mechanical bar screen, which Council recently awarded a contract for, will help to eliminate debris from making its way in and clogging the system in the future. He advised due to the emergency nature of the matter, bids were not received.

**RESOLUTION NO. TCOA CS 09 27 2021
AUTHORIZING CLOSED SESSION**

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Moorestown is subject to certain requirements of the Open Public Meetings Act, N.J. S. A. 10:4-6, et seq., and

WHEREAS, the Open Public Meetings Act, N.J.S.A 10:4-12, provides that a Closed Session, not open to the public, may be held for certain specified purposes when authorized by Resolution, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the Township Council of the Township of Moorestown to discuss in a session not open to the public certain matters relating to the item or items authorized by N.J.S.A. 10:4-12b and designated below:

_____(1) *Matters Required by Law to be Confidential:* Any matter which, by express provision of Federal law or State statute or rule of court shall be rendered confidential or excluded from the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Act.

_____(2) *Matters Where the Release of Information Would Impair the Right to Receive Funds:* Any matter in which the release of information would impair a right to receive funds from the Government of the United States.

_____(3) *Matters Involving Individual Privacy:* Any material, the disclosure of which constitutes an unwarranted invasion of individual privacy such as any records, data, reports, recommendations, or other personal material of any educational, training, social service, medical, health, custodial, child protection, rehabilitation, legal defense, welfare, housing, relocation, insurance and similar program or institution operated by a public body pertaining to any specific individual admitted to or served by such institution or program, including but not limited to, information relative to the individual's personal and family circumstances, and any material pertaining to admission, discharge, treatment, progress or condition of any individual, unless the individual concerned (or, in the case of a minor or incompetent, his guardian) shall request in writing that the same be disclosed publicly.

_____(4) *Matters Relating to Collective Bargaining Agreements:* Any collective bargaining agreement, or the terms and conditions which are proposed for inclusion in any collective bargaining agreement, including the negotiation of the terms and conditions thereof with employees or representatives of employees of the public body.

_____(5) *Matters Relating to the Purchase, Lease or Acquisition of Real Property or the Investment of Public Funds:* Any matter involving the purchase, lease or acquisition of real

property with public funds, the setting of banking rates or investment of public funds, where it could adversely affect the public interest if discussion of such matters were disclosed.

_____ (6) *Matters Relating to Public Safety and Property:* Any tactics and techniques utilized in protecting the safety and property of the public, provided that their disclosure could impair such protection. Any investigations of violations or possible violations of the law.

 X (7) *Matters Relating to Litigation, Negotiations and the Attorney-Client Privileges:* Any pending or anticipated litigation or contract negotiation in which the public body is, or may become, a party. Any matters falling within the attorney-client privilege, to the extent that confidentiality is required in order for the attorney to exercise his ethical duties as a lawyer.

_____ (8) *Matters Relating to the Employment Relationship:* Any matter involving the employment, appointment, termination of employment, terms and conditions of employment, evaluation of the performance of promotion or disciplining of any specific prospective public officer or employee or current public officer or employee employed or appointed by the public body, unless all the individual employees or appointees whose rights could be adversely affected request in writing that such matter or matters be discussed at a public meeting.

_____ (9) *Matters Relating to Potential Imposition of a Penalty:* Any deliberations of a public body occurring after a public hearing that may result in the imposition of a specific civil penalty upon the responding party or the suspension or loss of a license or permit belonging to the responding party bears responsibility.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Council of the Township of Moorestown, County of Burlington, State of New Jersey, assembled in public session, that a Closed Session closed to the public shall be held in the Town Hall, 111 West Second Street, Moorestown, New Jersey, for the discussion of matters relating to the specific items designated above.

It is anticipated that the deliberations conducted in closed session may be disclosed to the public upon the determination of the Township Council that the public interest will no longer be served by such confidentiality.

Mayor Gillespie advised that there will be no formal action when Council returns to the public; noting, however, all are welcomed to stay.

At 8:34 p.m., Council entered into closed session.

At 9:15 p.m., Council returned to the public meeting. Due to the sensitivity of the matters, Council had nothing to report.
